At the Ecclesiastical Conference held in the Cathedral Chapel, Philadelphia, the Rev. Gregory R. Scholtz, O. P., gave the exhortation, his subject being, "De Devotione Erga SS. Sacramentum." Fr. Scholtz, during the first week of January, gave a Triduum to the men of St. Alice's parish, one of the most flourishing parishes in the city of Philadelphia.

Rev. Vincent Cleary, O. P., gave several missions in Texas during the month of January. Fr. Cleary with Rev. W. D. Sullivan, O. P., gave a two weeks' mission from February 7th to the 21st, at Morgan City, Louisiana, and during Lent, are to give a three weeks' mission at Our Lady of Lourdes, New Orleans, Louisiana, followed by another at Pine Bluff, Arkansas, extending over two weeks.

A Triduum in honor of the "Little Flower" was given in St. Catherine's parish, New York City, by Rev. W. R. Bonniwell, O. P., from February 7-9. Fr. Bonniwell is also giving a series of sermons during Lent at the following places:—Sunday nights, Trenton, N. J.; Tuesday nights, at St. Catherine's, New York City; Wednesday nights, Fairview, Conn.; and Thursday noons, at Hunter College, New York.

On the last Sunday of November, the new Church and School of St. Dominic's in Youngstown, Ohio, was dedicated by Rt. Rev. Joseph Schrembs, Bishop of Cleveland. The dedication was attended by a number of prominent priests. The preacher on this occasion was the Very Rev. M. J. Ripple, O. P., P. G. C., to St. Catherine's Church, New York City; Rev. J. J. Sullivan, O. P., of St. Catherine's parish in New York City is now assistant at St. Dominic's Church, Washington, D. C.; Rev. J. R. Caien, O. P., has left St. Catherine's Church, New York City to become Prior of St. Joseph's in Somerset, Ohio.

The new Sisters' Convent of the Holy Name of Jesus, connected with the Holy Name Church, Philadelphia, was formerly opened on January 2nd. About seventy Sisters of the Immaculate Heart attended the opening. All those who had been stationed at the Convent since its foundation, twenty years ago, and all those who entered the Community from the parish, were invited. The Convent which is thoroughly Dominican and one of the finest in the Archdiocese, cost ninety thousand dollars.

During Pentecost week, the seventy-eighth Master General of the Order of Friars Preachers will be elected at the General Chapter to be held at Ocana, in the Province of Toledo, Spain. Those who will represent the Province of St. Joseph at this Chapter are the Very Rev. Provincial Raymond Meagher, O. P., S. T. Lr., and his alternate, not yet selected; Very Rev. W. D. Noon, O. P., S. T. M., President of Providence College; and Very Rev. J. A. Dempsey, O. P., S. T. Lr., Prior of the Convent of St. Catherine of Sienna, New York City.

On December 10, Very Rev. Ignatius Smith, O. P., S. T. Lr., was the principal speaker at the thirty-first annual Memorial Service of the Washington Lodge of Elks, and on January 17, he gave an address over the radio from the Paulist station in New York City, on "The Manliness of the Christian Ideal." On Sunday evening, January 25, Fr. Smith delivered a sermon on "The Moral Problems of the Day" before a gathering of more than three thousands Knights of Columbus and their friends, at their annual Solemn Vesper Service in the Crypt of the National Shrine, Washington, D. C.

On Friday, February 12, the Debating Team of Providence College, under the direction of the Dominican Fathers, met in debate for the first time, the Team from Fordham University. The question debated was: "Resolved that the United States Senate was justified in passing the resolution for our entrance into the World Court." The negative side of the question, supported for Providence by Edward McEntee, Francis Reynolds, and Edward Sullivan, was awarded the decision in this contest. The debate was broadcasted by Station WEAN, Providence.

The Very Rev. Provincial, Raymond Meagher, O. P., S. T. Lr., returned to San Francisco, Calif., on December 31, from his visitation of the Chinese Missions, having been absent from this country since October 11. He found the Missionaries in good health, full of enthusiasm and zeal for their work, and anxious to make even bigger strides in the future than during the past two years. With limited funds and resources at their disposal, they have succeeded in making real progress in their work. They rely on the assistance of their friends and sympathizers at home to help them attain even greater success in the years to come.

Lr., the Tre Ore service and Easter Sunday at St. Antoninus' Church, Newark, N. J.

Very Rev. D. J. Kennedy, O. P., S. T. M., gave the retreat to the Postulants at St. Catherine's Academy, Springfield, Ky., beginning February 25th; Fr. Kennedy delivered a lecture to the faculty and student body of Albert the Great College in New Haven, Conn., on the Feast of St. Thomas Aquinas, March 7. The retreat to the lay students of the Catholic University was given by Rev. Basil Saylor, O. P., S. T. Lr., from February 19 to 21. Rev. Edward Hughes, O. P., S. T. Lr., is conducting the Lenten course at the Sacred Heart Church, Jersey City, N. J.

The annual public exercises held in honor of St. Thomas Aquinas, took place at the House of Studies in Washington on the evening of March 8th. Papers read by Bros. John McGovern, O. P., Martin Shea, O. P., and Christopher Perrotta, O. P., on the subjects of "The Early Printed Editions of St. Thomas," "The Eucharistic Hymns of St. Thomas," and "St. Thomas and his Cord," furnished an evening of profit and pleasure. The principal feature of the program was a Solemn Disputation in which the subject, "Utrum, Si Beatitudo est Intellectivae Partis, Sit Operatio Intellectus an Voluntatis" was defended by Bro. Sebastian Gillespie, O. P., and opposed by Bro. Andrew Nowlen, O. P. Interspersed throughout the program were several musical numbers rendered by the novitiate orchestra and double quartette.

On January 11, a Solemn Pontifical Mass was celebrated in St. Patrick's Cathedral, New York City, in memory of Dowager Queen Margherita of Italy. Rt. Rev. John J. Dunn, Auxiliary Bishop of New York, was celebrant of the Mass; the Rt. Rev. Msgr. Joseph Silipigni, was assistant priest; the Rt. Rev. V. Jannuzzi, was deacon; and the Rev. Joseph Cafuzzi, was subdeacon. The Rev. Philip Robotti, O. P., a member of the Italian Missionary Band laboring in this country, delivered the eulogy in Italian, and the Rt. Rev. Msgr. Michael J. Lavelle, rector of St. Patrick's, spoke in English. Fr. Robotti recalled the charity and justice that had marked the life of the late Queen and emphasized the fact that Italy had lost the woman who first bore the title of Queen of United Italy. The services were attended by a large gathering of prominent officials representing many foreign Embassies as well as State and Governmental Administrations.

FOREIGN PROVINCES

Rev. Chr. Berutti, O. P., of the Province of Piedmont has been named professor of Canon Law at the University of Fribourg, Switzerland. He had previously occupied this chair at the Collegio Angelico.

When the Catholic Institute of Paris recently celebrated its fiftieth anniversary, Fathers Allo, Woroniecki and Gardeill, of the Order of Preachers, were present as representatives of Dominican teachers in France.

In connection with the celebration of its Silver Jubilee, the headquarters of the Perpetual Rosary of Santiago brought out an artistically illustrated album containing autographs and articles by many celebrated persons.

Rev. Fr. Gigon, O. P., of the Province of Toulouse, has been named professor of Dogmatic Theology at the University of Fribourg, in place of Very Rev. Mark Sales, the newly appointed Master of the Sacred Palace.

The Dominicans of the Province of Germany have recently taken possession of the historic Convent of St. Paul, at Worms, the ancient stronghold of Lutheranism. They have been accorded an enthusiastic welcome by the Catholic population of the city.

At Brussieres, France, there was conducted last November, a ceremony in honor of the parents and relatives of Pere Lacordaire who restored the Dominican Order in France. The graves of the family of Lacordaire were restored at the suggestion of Pere Noble, O. P., who was in charge of the ceremonies.

The second centenary of the foundation of the Academy of Albert the Great was observed recently at Cologne. The Archbishop of that city, Cardinal Schulte, received a commendatory letter from Cardinal Gasparri, in the name of the Holy Father, extolling the glories of Blessed Albert and felicitating the Academy on its splendid work.

The Catholic Association of France which concerns itself with the welfare of the youth of France of both sexes who are contemplating matrimony, has requested and received from the Vicar General of our Order, the Very Rev. Serapius Tamayo, O. P., J. C. D., permission to affiliate itself with the Angelic Warfare, hoping to obtain the graces so necessary for the matrimonial state by enlisting the aid of the great St. Thomas Aquinas.

Five new professors have been named this year at the Collegio Angelico, in Rome, by the Very Rev. Vicar General of the Order. They are:—Rev. Antoine G. Pelaez, O. P., of the Province of Spain, professor of Apologetics; Rev. Charles Bufalini, O. P., of the Roman Province, professor of Theodicy; Rev. Ange Pirotta, O. P., of the Province of Malta, professor of Logic, Critica, and Ontology; Rev. Narcisse Dominguez, O. P., of the Philippine Province, professor of Hebrew; and Rev. Seraphin Zarb, O. P., of the Province of Malta, professor of Greek.
