

THE REVEREND DANIEL FLAVIAN REILLY, O.P.

Death came very suddenly to Father Daniel Flavian Reilly, O.P., on October 5, 1962 at Our Lady of Fatima Hospital in Providence, R. I. His untimely end was a shock to all who knew him.

Rather Reilly was born in Flushing, N. Y., on July 8, 1907. As a youth he attended the public schools in Caldwell, N. J. Later he received his college education at Seton Hall University in South Orange. Entering the Dominican Order, he began his novitiate on September 26, 1931, at St. Rose Priory, Springfield, Ky., where he was professed a year later. His study of philosophy and theology were completed at the House of Studies, River Forest, Ill.; St. Joseph's Priory, Somerset, Ohio; and the House of Studies, Washington, D. C. Father Reilly was ordained priest on June 16, 1938, at St. Dominic's Church, Washington, D. C., by Bishop John M. McNamara, auxiliary of Baltimore, Md.

Following ordination, Father Reilly pursued graduate studies in history at the Catholic University of America, from which he received a doctorate in philosophy. He was then assigned to the faculty of Providence College, where he remained until his death. There he distinguished himself as an excellent teacher and true friend.

A Solemn Requiem Mass was sung at St. Pius Church, Providence, R.I. on October 9, 1962. The celebrant was Very Rev. George C. Reilly, O.P., a brother of the deceased. Very Rev. Ernest A. Hogan, O.P. was the deacon and Rev. John P. Kenny, O.P. was the subdeacon. The eulogy was delivered by Rev. Joseph L. Lennon, O.P. Burial took place at the college cemetery.

Among the 250 priests attending the funeral were Rt. Rev. Matthew C. Clark, vicar general of the Diocese of Providence; Rt. Rev. John B. Kennedy, St. Joseph's Cathedral, Hartford, Conn.; Very Rev. William D. Marrin, O.P., Provincial of St. Joseph's Province.

To Father Reilly's brother and three sisters, and to his numerous friends, *Dominicana* extends its deep sympathy.

THE REVEREND MARTIN J. JORDAN, O.P.

Reverend Martin J. Jordan, O.P., 43, died Friday evening, October 12, 1962, while he was visiting his sister, Miss Lorette E. Jordan in Sea Girt, New Jersey.

Born on May 22, 1919 in Jersey City, N.J., the son of the late Martin J. and Anne (Lynch) Jordan, Father Jordan received his Bachelor of Arts degree from St. Peter's College, Jersey City, then served in World War II. In 1948 he entered the Dominican Order, was professed in Springfield, Ky., and studied at St. Joseph's Priory, Somerset, Ohio, and also at the Dominican House of Studies in Washington, D.C., where he received a Bachelor of Sacred Theology degree in 1952 and a Licentiate of Sacred Theology in 1955. On June 12, 1954, he was ordained in St. Dominic's Church, Washington, D.C.

Assigned to the faculty of Providence College, Providence, R.I., in 1955, Father Jordan served as moderator of the Student Congress, associate director of the School of Adult Education, assistant dean of discipline, dean of men from August 1957 to the following August, and chaplain of Finnegan Council, K. of C.

On October 17, 1962, at the Dominican church of St. Pius, Providence, R.I., a Solemn Requiem Mass was celebrated by his brother, Very Rev. Francis J. D. Jordan, O.P.; Rev. John L. Hart, O.P. was deacon and Rev. Joseph R. Desmond, O.P. was subdeacon. Rev. Thomas J. Shanley, O.P. and Rev. Maurice D. Nelan, O.P. were acolytes; Rev. Charles A. Farrell, O.P. thurifer; Rev. John P. Gerhard, O.P. holy water bearer; Rev. Richard A. Fleck, O.P., cross bearer. The eulogy was delivered by the Rev. Dennis C. Kane, O.P. The Requiem Mass was chanted by the Dominican Fathers' Choir and the Providence College Glee Club sang the "Alma Mater." Priests, religious, sisters, national, state and city officials and delegations of various organizations attended the funeral Mass.

After the Mass, students formed a guard of honor along the road from Eaton Street to the Providence College cemetery. There were military honors bestowed at the burial. An Honor Guard was composed of Fourth Degree Knights of Columbus and members of the Friars Club of Providence College. Very Rev. Ernest A. Hogan, O.P. conducted the ceremonies at the cemetery.

Besides his brother and sister already mentioned, Father Jordan leaves another sister, Mrs. Anne Hart of Jersey City and two other brothers, Joseph A. Jordan of Sea Girt and Vincent J. Jordan of Jersey City.
