

Reverend John Hugh Hartnett, O.P.

On October 24, 1963, the Reverend John Hugh Hartnett, O.P. died in Buffalo, New York. He had been ill for a long time.

Father Hartnett was born in Brooklyn, N.Y. on August 12, 1893. He received his early education in the public schools of Buffalo, N.Y. and later attended Canisius College, Buffalo, N.Y. and Aquinas College, Columbus, Ohio. Upon his entrance into the Dominican Order, Father Hartnett studied at St. Joseph's Priory, Somerset, Ohio; St. Rose's Priory, Springfield, Ky.; and the Dominican House of Studies, Washington, D.C. He was ordained at St. Dominic's Church, Washington, D.C. on June 21, 1928 by Bishop Thomas J. Shahan, rector of Catholic University.

Upon the completion of his studies, Father Hartnett pursued parochial and missionary work throughout various parts of St. Joseph's Province. For many years he had been assigned to St. Catherine's Priory, New York, N.Y., where he carried out his apostolic labors with zeal.

On October 28, 1963, a Solemn Mass of Requiem was sung by the Very Rev. Patrick J. Conaty, O.P., at St. Catherine's Church, New York, N.Y. The Very Rev. Vincent C. Dore, O.P. was deacon, and the Rev. James D. Enright, O.P. was subdeacon. The Rev. Alfred P. Bachand, O.P. preached the eulogy. Burial was at All Souls' Cemetery, Pleasantville, N.Y.

Reverend Herman D. Schneider
